Prompt Ideas for Elementary Students

- Close your eyes and picture a beautiful vacation destination. Write a story that takes place in this spot, and don't forget to use a lot of describing words.
- Write a fictional adventure story that features both you and your best friend as the main characters.
- Think about the animals that live at the farm. Do you think they ever talk to one another? What sorts of things do you think they do together when the farmers go to sleep at night? Write a story about how you imagine life at the farm to be like for the animals.
- Imagine that you traveled through time and landed in the future. You meet your future grandchildren, and they take you to their school. What is it like? How is their futuristic school the same as yours? How is it different?
- Imagine that the main character in your story shrank to the size of an ant. What would happen to your character? How would life be different now that they were so small?
