**Gertrude Stein's Surrealist Years** Ery Shin, 2020-06-23 Examines how surrealism enriches our understanding of Stein's writing through its poetics of oppositions *Gertrude Stein's Surrealist Years* brings to life Stein's surrealist sensibilities and personal values borne from her WWII anxieties not least of which originated in a dread of anti-Semitism Stein's earlier works such as *Tender Buttons* and *Lucy Church Amiably* tend to prioritize formal innovations over narrative building and overt political motifs However Ery Shin argues that Stein's later works engage more with storytelling and life writing in startling ways most emphatically and poignantly through the surrealist lens Beginning with *The Autobiography of Alice B. Toklas* and continuing in later works Stein renders legible her war-torn era's jarring dystopian energies through narratives filled with hallucinatory visions teleportation extreme coincidences action reversals doppelgangers dream sequences spanning both sleeping and waking states and great whiffs of the occult Such surrealist gestures are predicated on Stein's return to the independent clause and by extension to plot characterization and anecdotes By summoning the marvelous in a historically situated world Stein joins
