Clitics Andrew Spencer, Ana R. Luis, 2012-07-12 In most languages we find little words which resemble a full word but which cannot stand on their own. Instead they have to lean on a neighbouring word like the *d* in *ve* and the unstressed *em* in *Kim d* *ve* helped *em*. *Kim* would have helped them. These are clitics and they are found in most of the world's languages. In English the clitic forms appear in the same place in the sentence that the full form of the word would appear in but in many languages clitics obey quite separate rules of placement. This book is the first introduction to clitics providing a complete summary of their properties, their uses, the reasons why they are of interest to linguists and the various theoretical approaches that have been proposed for them. The book describes a whole host of clitic systems and presents data from over 100 languages.

Spanish Clitics on the Move Elisabeth Mayer, 2017-04-10 This volume explores the complex relationship between primary agreement by means of object marking or differential object marking (DOM) and secondary agreement through clitics in non-standardized variation data from Llémena Spanish contact varieties (LSCV). As such it is concerned with diachronic as well as synchronic morphosyntactic variation of the third person object pronoun paradigm, so-called clitics, as used in Standard Spanish and non-standardized Spanish contact dialects. The argumentation as well as the data presented cross diachronic and synchronic boundaries.

Clitics Joel Ashmore Nevis, 1994-01-01 This bibliography provides an alphabetical listing of over 1500 articles, books and dissertations that treat in some way the topic of clitics and related matters, e.g. affixes, words, word order, movement, sandhi, etc. The beginning point for the bibliographic entries is 1892, taking Jacob Wackernagel's classic work as the point of departure, and the entries cover the subsequent 100-year period. Each entry is accompanied by a series of descriptors which give an indication of the content of the item. Nearly one-third of the book is a detailed analytic index based on the descriptors which can aid in topical searches for relevant material. Prefatory matter includes an essay 'What is a Clitic' by Arnold M. Zwicky, a brief consideration of Wackernagel's scholarly career by Brian D. Joseph, and information on the format and use of the book itself.
