Adaptations Deborah Cartmell, Imelda Whelehan, 2022 *Adaptations: Critical and Primary Sources* is a three-volume reference resource that brings together over 80 landmark texts in adaptation studies. Volume One covers the history of adaptation studies by plotting the prehistory of the field beginning with Vachel Lindsay's classic *Art of the Moving Picture* 1915 through Virginia Woolf's classic essay on *The Cinema* through to some of the most important critical and theoretical interventions up until the 1990s when the area really emerges as a critical force in the academy. Volume Two collects essays from the last 25 years showing how the scholarly legacy laid out in Volume One still has a profound impact on adaptation studies today while charting the process of critical and theoretical maturation. This volume shows how adaptation studies has outgrown its contested place in the gap of film and literary studies and how its interventions transcend disciplinary perspectives across the arts and humanities. Volume Three covers key case studies such as Christine Geraghty's take on adapting Westerns, Ian Inglis' understanding of the transformation of music into movies, and Eckart Voigts' concept on Jane Austen and participatory culture. With topics ranging from the limitations of the novel to adapting stage to screen, contributions from a wide range of international scholars, film critics, and novelists combine to make *Adaptations: Critical and Primary Sources* an original overview of critical debates today. Cartmell and Whelehan introduce each excerpt and offer a critical overview of the collected work, the rationale for its inclusion, and suggestions for further reading.

The Adaptation Industry Simone Murray, 2012-03-12 *Adaptation* constitutes the driving force of contemporary culture with stories adapted across an array of media formats. However, adaptation studies has been concerned almost exclusively with textual analysis, in particular with compare and contrast studies of individual novel and film pairings. This has left almost completely unexamined crucial questions of how adaptations come to be made: what are the industries with the greatest stake in making them, and who the decision makers are in the adaptation process. *The Adaptation Industry* reimagines adaptation not as an abstract process but as a material industry. It presents the adaptation industry as a cultural economy of six interlocking institutions: stakeholders and decision makers all engaged in the actual business of adapting texts; authors, agents, publishers, book prize committees, scriptwriters, and screen producers and distributors. Through trading in intellectual property rights to cultural works, these six nodal points in the adaptation network are tightly interlinked with success for one party potentially auguring for success in other spheres. But marked rivalries between these institutional

forces also exist with competition characterizing every aspect of the adaptation process This book constructs an overdue sociology of contemporary literary adaptation never losing sight of the material and institutional dimensions of this powerful process

Filming Forster focuses upon the challenges of producing film adaptations of five of E M Forster's novels Rather than follow the older comparative approach which typically damned the film for not being faithful to the novel this project explores the interactive relationship between film and novel That relationship is implicit in the title Filming Forster rather than Forster Filmed which would suggest a completed process A film adaptation forever changes the novel from which it was adapted just as a return to the novel changes the viewer's perceptions of the film Adapting Forster's novels for the screen was postponed until well after the author's death in 1970 because the trustees of the author's estate fulfilled his wish that his work not be filmed Following the appearance of David Lean's film *A Passage to India* in 1984 four other film adaptations were released within seven years Perhaps the most important was the Merchant Ivory production of *Maurice* based upon Forster's gay novel published a year after his death That film was among the first to approach same sex relationships between men in a serious respectful and generally optimistic manner *Edinburgh Companion to Charles Dickens and the Arts* Claire Wood, Juliet John, 2024-05-31
