Studies in Ancient Greek Dialects Georgios K. Giannakis, Emilio Crespo, Panagiotis Filos, 2017-12-18 A new collective volume with over twenty important studies on less well studied dialects of ancient Greek particularly of the northern regions The book covers geographically a broad area of the classical Greek world ranging from Central Greece to the overseas Greek colonies of Thrace and the Black Sea Particular emphasis is placed on the epichoric varieties of areas on the northern fringe of the classical Greek world including Thessaly Epirus and Macedonia Recent advances in research are taken into consideration in providing state of the art accounts of these understudied dialects but also of more well known dialects like Lesbian In addition other papers address special intriguing topics in these but also in other dialects such as Thessalian Lesbian and Ionic or focus on important multi dialectal corpora such as the oracular tablets from Dodona Finally a number of studies examine broader topics like the supraregional Doric koinai or the concept of dialect continuum or even explore the possibility of an ancient Balkansprachbund which included Greek too This new reference work covers a gap in current research and will be indispensable for people interested in Greek dialectology and ancient Greek in general ,

Building Modality with Syntax Camille Denizot, Liana Tronci, 2023-09-18 Despite the intensive research carried out in recent years modality remains an intriguing and challenging issue in linguistics This book investigates modality from a syntactic viewpoint and with a bottom up approach A strong focus of the book is the interaction between the different linguistic tools that build modality moods modal verbs modal adverbs etc taking both the role of syntactic structure and the compositionality of modal meanings into account The volume comprises corpus based studies devoted to several syntactic aspects of modality in Ancient Greek within different theoretical frameworks The chapters shed new light on different modal categories e g epistemicity possibility counterfactuality evidentiality subjectivity and show how these modal meanings arise from the combination of different linguistic devices in specific syntactic contexts e g combinations of modal elements types of main and dependent clauses types of illocutionary acts etc By approaching modality from a different perspective and providing an up to date discussion of several aspects of modality the book makes a significant contribution to current debates

Orality and Performance in Classical Attic Prose Alessandro Vatri, 2017-02-23 This study discusses the question of whether there is a linguistic difference between classical Attic prose texts intended for public oral delivery and those intended for written circulation and private performance Identifying such a difference which exclusively reflects these disparities in modes of reception has proven to be a difficult challenge for both literary scholars and cultural historians of the ancient world with answers not always satisfactory from a methodological and an analytical point of view The legitimacy of the question is first addressed through a definition of what such slippery notions as orality and oral performance mean in the context of classical Athens reconstruction of the situations in which the extant prose texts were meant to be received and an explanation of the grounds on which we may expect linguistic features of the texts to be related to such situations The idea

that texts conceived for public delivery needed to be as clear as possible is substantiated by available cultural historical and anthropological facts however these do not imply that the opposite was required of texts conceived for private reception In establishing a rigorous methodology for the reconstruction of the native perception of clarity in the original contexts of textual reception this study offers a novel approach to assessing orality in classical Greek prose through examination of linguistic and grammatical features of style It builds upon the theoretical insights and current experimental findings of modern psycholinguistics providing scholars with a new key to the minds of ancient writers and audiences **Ancient**
