**Neoliberal Moral Economy** Jörg Wiegratz, 2016-11-17 This book offers a fresh take on a major question of global debate what explains the rise in economic fraud in so many societies around the world The author argues that the current age of fraud is an outcome of not only political economic but also moral transformations that have taken place in societies reshaped by neoliberalism Using the case of Uganda the book traces these socio cultural and especially moral repercussions of embedding neoliberalism Uganda offers an important case of investigation for three reasons the high level of foreign intervention by donors aid agencies international organisations NGOs and corporations that have tried to produce the first fully fledged market society in Africa there the country s reputation as having adopted neoliberal reforms most extensively and the intensification of fraud in many sectors of the economy since the early 2000s The book explores the rise and operation of the neoliberal moral economy and its world of hard and fraudulent practices It analyses especially the moral economic character of agricultural produce markets in eastern Uganda It shows that neoliberal moral restructuring is a highly political contested and conflict ridden process predominantly works via recalibrating the political economic structure of a country and deeply affects how people think and go about earning a living and treat others with whom they do business The book offers an in depth data based analysis of the moral climate of a market society in motion and in so doing offers insights and lessons for elsewhere in the Global South and North

**Women's Work** Jennifer Moore, 2025-03-11 When women have full socioeconomic citizenship as well as equitable and respectful partnerships with men transformative justice can be sustained in postconflict societies In Women's Work Jennifer Moore presents a reimagined theory of peacebuilding and transformative justice based on the experiences and insights of women farmers and microentrepreneurs who lived through protracted civil conflicts drawing on seven years of interviews with women activists across ten communities five in the Acholi region of Northern Uganda and five in the Moyamba and Koinadugu Districts of Sierra Leone Despite the important differences between the preconflict and conflict histories and demographics of the two countries Moore finds commonalities in the practical yet visionary approaches to community life emerging from the core values daily activities and long range goals shared by rural cooperative members in both regions Collective survival communal healing and conflict resolution define the rhythm of these women's daily lives as they go about building peace piecemeal They reject punitive retribution models and demand instead a peacebuilding model that advocates for advances in material well being the acknowledgment of state accountability for community suffering and reconciliation and restoration of community networks But most important Moore amplifies these women's voices when they insist that legal equality for women and healthy partnerships between women and men are also essential components to enduring transformation of their societies Moore theorizes what peacebuilding look like if it were modeled on these women led matriarchically structured communities that proved not only to be effective at holding governments accountable but also to have the capacity to feed their people and revitalize their local economies Women's Work shows that when women have full socioeconomic citizenship as well as equitable and respectful partnerships with men transformative justice can be sustained through the arts of collective livelihood violence free conflict management and celebration

*Kierkegaard's Journals and Notebooks, Volume 7* Søren Kierkegaard, 2014-10-05 For over a century the Danish thinker Søren Kierkegaard 1813-55 has been at the center of a number of important discussions concerning not only philosophy and theology but also more recently fields such as social thought psychology and contemporary aesthetics especially literary theory Despite his relatively short life Kierkegaard was an extraordinarily prolific writer as attested to by the 26 volume Princeton University Press edition of all of his published writings But Kierkegaard left behind nearly as much unpublished writing most of which consists of what are called his journals and notebooks Kierkegaard has long been recognized as one of history s great journal keepers but only rather small portions of his journals and notebooks are what we usually understand by the term diaries By far the greater part of Kierkegaard s journals and notebooks consists of reflections on a myriad of subjects philosophical religious political personal Studying his journals and notebooks takes us into his workshop where we can see his entire universe of thought We can witness the genesis of his published works to be sure but we can also see whole galaxies of concepts new insights and fragments large and small of partially or almost entirely completed but unpublished works Kierkegaard s Journals and Notebooks enables us to see the thinker in dialogue with his times and with himself Volume 7 of this 11 volume series includes six of Kierkegaard s important NB journals Journals NB15 through NB20 covering the months from early

January 1850 to mid September of that year By this time it had become clear that popular sovereignty ushered in by the revolution of 1848 and ratified by the Danish constitution of 1849 had come to stay and Kierkegaard now intensified his criticism of the notion that everything even matters involving the human soul could be decided by balloting He also continued to direct his barbs at the established Danish Church and its clergy particularly Bishop J P Mynster and Professor H L Martensen at the press and at the attempt by modern philosophy to comprehend the incomprehensibility of faith Kierkegaard's reading notes include entries on Augustine the Stoics German mystics Luther pietist authors and Rousseau while his autobiographical reflections circle around the question of which if any of several essays explaining his life and works he ought to publish Perhaps unsurprisingly Kierkegaard's more personal reflections return once again to his public feud with M A Goldschmidt and his broken engagement to Regine Olsen Kierkegaard wrote his journals in a two column format one for his initial entries and the second for the extensive marginal comments that he added later This edition of the journals reproduces this format includes several photographs of original manuscript pages and contains extensive scholarly commentary on the various entries and on the history of the manuscripts being reproduced **Creativity and Innovation**

its existence resulted in a national tragedy the effects of which are still being felt The book begins in the late nineteenth century when the disorders brought on by exposure to coal mine dust were first identified as components of a debilitating and distinctive illness For several decades thereafter coal miners dust disease was accepted in both lay and professional circles as a major industrial disease Derickson describes how after the turn of the century medical professionals and industry representatives worked to discredit and supplant knowledge about black lung with such success that this disease ceased to be recognized Many authorities maintained that breathing coal mine dust was actually beneficial to health Derickson shows that activists ultimately forced society to overcome its complacency about this deadly and preventable disease He chronicles the growth of an unprecedented movement from the turn of the century miners union to the social medicine activists in the mid twentieth century and the black lung insurgents of the late sixties which eventually won landmark protections and compensation with the enactment of the Federal Coal Mine Health and Safety Act in 1969 An extraordinary work of scholarship Black Lung exposes the enormous human cost of producing the energy source responsible for making the United States the world s preeminent industrial nation
