**Contrastive Studies in Construction Grammar** Hans C. Boas, 2010-11-11 The papers in this volume provide a contrastive application of Construction Grammar By referencing a well described constructional phenomenon in English each paper provides a solid foundation for describing and analyzing its constructional counterpart in another language This approach shows that the semantic description including discourse pragmatic and functional factors of an English construction can be regarded as a first step towards a tertium comparationis that can be employed for comparing and contrasting the formal properties of constructional counterparts in other languages Thus the meaning pole of constructions should be regarded as the primary basis for comparisons of constructions across languages the form pole is only secondary This volume shows that constructions are viable descriptive and analytical tools for cross linguistic comparisons that make it possible to capture both language specific idiosyncratic properties as well as cross linguistic generalizations *Construction Grammar* Thomas Hoffmann, 2022-07-28 What do speakers of a language have to know and what can they figure out on the basis of that knowledge in order for them to use their language successfully This is the question at the heart of Construction Grammar an approach to the study of language that views all dimensions of language as equal contributors to shaping linguistic expressions The trademark characteristic of Construction Grammar is the insight that language is a repertoire of more or less complex patterns constructions that integrate form and meaning This textbook shows how a Construction Grammar approach can be used to analyse the English language offering explanations for language acquisition variation and change It covers all levels of syntactic description from word formation and inflectional morphology to phrasal and clausal phenomena and information structure constructions Each chapter includes exercises and further readings making it an accessible introduction for undergraduate students of linguistics and English language

**Functional-Cognitive Space** Christopher S. Butler, Francisco González-García, 2014-08-28 This book intended primarily for researchers and advanced students expands greatly on previous work by the authors exploring the topography of the multidimensional functional cognitive space within which functional cognitive and/or constructionist approaches to language can be located. The analysis covers a broad range of 16 such approaches with some additional references to Chomskyan minimalism and is based on 58 questionnaire items each rated by 29 experts on particular models for their importance in the model concerned. These ratings are analysed statistically to reveal overall patterns of dissimilarity across models. The questionnaire ratings and experts' comments are then used together with the authors' close reading of the literature in detailed discussion leading to a final dichotomous rating for each feature in each model, the results again being analysed statistically. The final chapter presents the overall conclusions and suggests how existing collaborations between approaches could be strengthened and new ones created in future research. *Exploring Functional Cognitive Space* has been awarded the 2016 prize of the Spanish Association for Applied Linguistics (Asociación Española de Lingüística Aplicada AESLA) for work by experienced researchers.

*Changing Structures* Mark Kaunisto, Mikko Höglund, Paul Rickman, 2018-05-15 This book is a collection of eleven research articles which altogether serve as a contribution to the study of verb complementation and other constructions, an area of investigation which bridges observations on the spectrum of lexico-grammar, syntax and semantics. In terms of methodological approaches and the types of linguistic patterns examined, the chapters cast light on the subject from a variety of perspectives and the volume is structured in a way that groups the various perspectives under three main themes according to their main focus and/or methodological approaches: namely, the semantic and functional descriptions of constructions, the investigation into the distribution of complementation patterns and the study of innovative patterns in ESL contexts and languages other than English. All chapters in this volume employ data from large electronic corpora where possible: the BNC, COCA, COHA, GloWbE, NOW and newly compiled corpora representing regional varieties of English.

During language acquisition, German children from six years on use structures that are similar to those of adults in their language group and also encode all semantic components from an early age. In striking contrast, French children up to ten years have difficulties producing some of the complex structures that are necessary for the simultaneous expression of several semantic components. Nonetheless, in addition to these striking cross-linguistic differences, the results of this study also clearly show similar developmental progressions in other respects, suggesting the impact of general developmental determinants.      **The Oxford**
