The Mountain Arapesh exhibited qualities that many might consider feminine they were in general passive affectionate and peaceloving Though Mead partially explains the male s femininity as being due to the type of nourishment available to the Arapesh she maintains social conditioning to be a factor in the type of lifestyle led by both sexes Mead's study encapsulates all aspects of the Arapesh culture She discusses betrothal and marriage customs sexuality gender roles diet religion arts agriculture and rites of passage In possibly a portent for the breakdown of traditional roles and beliefs in the latter part of the twentieth century Mead discusses the purpose of rites of passage in maintaining societal values and social control Mead also discovered that both male and female parents took an active role in raising their children Furthermore it was found that there were few conflicts over property the Arapesh having no concept of land ownership maintained a peaceful existence with each other In his new introduction to The Mountain Arapesh Paul B Roscoe assesses the importance of Mead's work in light of modern anthropological and ethnographic research as well as how it fits into her own canon of writings Roscoe discusses findings he culled from a trip to Papua New Guinea in 1991 to clarify some ambiguities in Mead's work His travels also served to help reconstruct what had happened to the Arapesh since Mead's historic visit in the early 1930s Annual Report of the Under Secretary for Mines to the ...
