Complex Predicates Mengistu Amberber, Brett Baker, Mark Harvey, 2010-04-22 Complex predicates are multipredicational but monoclausal structures They have proven problematic for linguistic theory particularly for proposed distinctions between the lexicon morphology and syntax This volume focuses on the mapping from morphosyntactic structures to event structure and in particular the constraints on possible mappings The volume showcases the coverb construction a complex predicate construction which though widespread has received little attention in the literature The coverb construction contrasts with more familiar serial verb constructions The coverb construction generally maps only to event structures like those of monomorphemic verbs whereas serial verb constructions map to a range of event structures differing from those of monomorphemic verbs The volume coverage is truly cross linguistic including languages from Australia Papua New Guinea Southeast Asia the Indian subcontinent East Africa and North America The volume establishes a new arena of research in event structure syntax and cross linguistic typology The Handbook of Persian Dialects and Dialectology Alireza

**Noun-Based Constructions in the History of Portuguese and Spanish** Patrícia Amaral, Manuel Delicado Cantero, 2022-04-28. This book explores syntactic and semantic change in three types of construction in Spanish and Portuguese: i) complex determiner phrases with clausal adjunction: *el hecho de* / *o facto de*; ii) complex prepositions: complementizers and complex connectives: *sin embargo de* / *sem embargo de* / *so b pena de*; and iii) complex predicates containing light verbs: *dar consejo* / *conselho de*. While these constructions are syntactically different, they are all clause-taking complex expressions containing a noun followed by the functional preposition *de* / *of*. This book is the first work to use a systematic comparative corpus study to explore these expressions together; this approach allows individual changes to be distinguished from general changes as well as emphasizing the chronological clustering of changes that involve complex constructions in both languages. By studying mechanisms of language change and their outcomes in two sister languages, Patrícia Amaral and Manuel Delicado Cantero address questions such as: How do complex constructions evolve? How does the meaning of the noun change when considered in isolation and when compared to the meaning of the whole construction? And how do syntactic categories change over time? This study of two closely related languages reveals distinct developments occurring in parallel and provides a crucial test case for theories of language change.

**Granularity in the Verbalization of Events and Objects** Katerina Stathi, 2023-08-15. The study departs from the observation that in expressing ideas, some languages encode more details than others. It investigates whether languages encode events and or

objects at a coarse grained e g put glass as opposed to a fine grained e g lay wine glass level systematically The level of detail is termed granularity which is viewed as a cline from fine grained semantic specificity to coarse grained meaning semantic generality Four languages are investigated German English Greek and Turkish The study draws on elicited data from a naming task The verbalization of events is based on event and object descriptions in selected semantic domains The results reveal significant granularity effects between languages and language types satellite framed vs verb framed The study is relevant for scholars interested in linguistic typology lexical and semantic typology contrastive linguistics event representation psycholinguistics and cognitive semantics

### **Murrinhpatha Morphology and Phonology** John

Mansfield,2019-04-01 Murrinhpatha is an Australian Aboriginal language spoken in a region of tropical savannah and tidal inlets on the north coast of the continent Some 3000 speakers live mostly in the towns of Wadeye and Nganmarriyanga though they maintain close ties to their traditional lands totems and spirit ancestors Murrinhpatha word structure is highly complex and quite distinct from the better known Pama Nyungan languages of central and southern Australia Murrinhpatha is characterised by prolific compounding clitic clusters cumulative inflection irregular allomorphy and phonological assimilation This book provides a comprehensive account of these phenomena giving particular attention to questions of morphological constituency lexical storage and whether there is really such thing as a word unit
