Rhythm Vincent Barletta, 2024-05-31 More than the persistent beat of a song or the structural frame of poetry rhythm is a deeply imbedded force that drives our world and is also a central component of the condition of human existence It s the pulse of the body a power that orders matter a strange and natural force that flows through us Virginia Woolf describes it as

and she struggled to combine her love of music with her love of God She was a tireless humanitarian and made ongoing attempts to help dozens of down and out musicians in the 1950s her apartment was at times virtually a rehab Though she was often in emotional despair she found comfort for her many disappointments and hurts not only in her music but in her spirituality Linda Dahl granted unprecedented access to the large Williams archive has given us the whole of Williams s very full life from her often harrowing days on the road to her tumultuous marriages and love affairs from the ups and downs of her unique fifty year career to the remarkable spirituality that came to inform both her daily life and her music This is a striking protrait of one of our least understood and most important musicians
