The Ballets of Ludwig Minkus Robert Ignatius Letellier, 2008-10-01 The composer Ludwig Minkus represents one of music's biggest mysteries Who was he Hardly anything is known about him and yet he occupied an influential position in the theatres of the Imperial ballet in late nineteenth century Russia He has been recognised as a predecessor of Tchaikovsky but as a musician is commonly held to have been so feeble as to be beneath contempt Yet despite the scorn heaped on him and his consequent obscurity Minkus is far from being forgotten Since the early 1960s his name has slowly begun to re-surface Two works Don Quixote 1869 and La Bayadère 1877 have been presented in their entirety for the first time to new audiences all over the world The musical and dramatic power of both ballets has taken people by surprise The stories have a very real human appeal the choreography attracts the admiration of balletomanes and the music with its rhythm verve and beauty of melody holds attention and engages the heart wherever it is heard This introduction seeks to discover something more behind the blank façade of Minkus's life and work What do we actually know about him as a man and as an artist Are we able to apprehend his oeuvre as a whole and how

much can we establish from the available material What is the nature of the music he created for those few works that have survived the years and that have come to the fore again recently to delight those who have ears to hear This study includes iconography from the life and times of the composer many musical examples from his works and a comprehensive bibliography and discography

A Sentimental Education Gustave Flaubert, 2000 Frederic Moreau a moderately gifted young provincial is ambitious in many ways he dreams of fame of vast wealth of literary and artistic achievement of a grand passion On the Paris paddle steamer which transports him to his home town of Nogent sur Seine at the outset of the novel he becomes transfixed by the demure Madame Arnoux and back in Paris cultivates her ebullient and enterprising husband in order to be near her Frederic s devotion fluctuates like his other enthusiasms and he is caught up in the intense pleasures and the inevitable ennui of Parisian life

The Three Musketeers Alexandre Dumas, 1998 A historical romance *The Three Musketeers* tells the story of the early adventures of the young Gascon gentleman D Artagnan and his three friends from the regiment of the King s Musketeers Athos Porthos and Aramis Under the watchful eye of their

patron M de Treville the four defend the honour of the regiment against the guards of Cardinal Richelieu and the honour of the queen against the machinations of the Cardinal himself as the power struggles of seventeenth century France are vividly played out in the background *The Masterpiece* Émile Zola,1999 This is the most autobiographical of the 20 novels in Zola's Rougon Macquart series It provides an insight into his friendship with Cezanne and presents an account of the turbulent Bohemian world in which the Impressionists came to prominence

Adolphe Benjamin Constant,2001 Adolphe enjoys all the advantages of a noble birth and an intellectual ability yet he is haunted by the meaninglessness of life Thus he merely seeks distraction in the pursuit of the beautiful but older and married Ellenore The young Adolphe inexperienced in the language of love falls for her unexpectedly and falters under the burden of an illicit love that is destructive to his public career Unable to commit himself fully to Ellenore and yet unwilling to face the pain he would cause by leaving her Adolphe finds himself incapable of resolving an increasingly tragic situation Written in a clear and thoughtful style Adolphe 1816 reveals Constant's own experiences in love while reflecting his anxieties for the possibility of any authentic commitment to someone other than ourselves whether emotional or political in a disenchanted world *Montaigne and the Art of Free-thinking* Richard Scholar,2010 We know a great deal of what Michel de Montaigne 1533-92 Shakespeare's near contemporary and fellow literary mastermind thinks We know because he tells us on page after page of his Essais which have marked literature and thought since the European Renaissance and remain to this day compelling reading It might seem surprising with this wealth of evidence at hand that Montaigne could prove so elusive in his thinking Yet elusive he proves as volatile as he is voluble What we are left wondering does all that thinking amount to How is it to be understood And what value might it have for us Montaigne has too often seen his thinking reduced to the expression of an ism Richard Scholar investigates the nature and detail of Montaigne's evolving attempts to seek out that elusive thing called truth Examining at close quarters passages from across the Essais Scholar provides twenty first century readers with a companion guide to a text that is rooted in the time and place of its composition and yet continues to speak to the present to haunt its readers to ask them the questions that matter
