Older adults are living longer with more chronic disease and functional impairment than at any other time in history. Office based practice is inadequate to meet the needs of patients who have difficulty leaving their homes for routine or urgent visits and health care clinicians must choose between trying to manage their problems via telehealth or sending them to the emergency room via ambulance. Indeed many clinicians receive little or no training in home based medical care and are unable to consider a home visit that might avert a health crisis or an emergency room visit. Other clinicians know that house calls are possible but may not know how to work them into day to day practice. In recent years a growing number of clinicians have focused their practice on home based medical care to meet the rising need. In fact there has been a substantial increase in house calls provided to Medicare beneficiaries. In 2023 over 750 000 traditional Medicare beneficiaries and in 2022 over 680 000 Medicare Advantage beneficiaries received longitudinal home based medical care. While the number of house calls has increased rapidly the number of clinicians providing those visits has markedly decreased suggesting that clinicians who are providing such care are making it the sole focus of their practice. This book is intended to be a practical reference for any clinician who has struggled to care for an older adult who has difficulty getting to the office. By describing fundamental principles of geriatric house call medicine and application to specific diseases and conditions we hope to provide clinicians with the tools they need to provide timely compassionate and high quality care for their older adult patients. The second edition has been updated to reflect changes in the healthcare system and approaches to care since the publication of the first edition.

Ideally a comprehensive team of

The Role of Family Physicians in Older People Care Jacopo Demurtas, Nicola Veronese, 2021-12-30. This book provides family doctors with a wealth of evidence-based indications and tips regarding geriatric medicine and approaches for the management of older patients to be applied in daily practice. After discussing old and new features of healthy ageing and the approaches required in Family Medicine Consultation, the text introduces key elements of geriatric medicine such as frailty, sarcopenia, and the comprehensive geriatric assessment (CGA) before describing a range of characteristics unique to older patients in different contexts, with a dedicated section on Palliative Care. The role of polypharmacy and the importance of quaternary prevention and deprescribing are also addressed. Finally, the book emphasizes both the importance of a humanistic approach in caring and the approach of research and meta-research in geriatrics. Though many texts explore the role of primary care professionals in geriatric medicine, the role of family doctors in older people care has not yet been clearly addressed despite the growing burden of ageing, which has been dubbed the silver tsunami. Family physicians care for individuals in the context of their family, community, and culture, respecting the autonomy of their patients. In negotiating management plans with their patients, family doctors integrate physical, psychological, social, cultural, and existential factors, utilizing the knowledge and trust engendered by repeated visits. They do so by promoting health, preventing disease, providing cures, care, or palliation, and promoting patient empowerment and self-management. This will likely become all the more important since we are witnessing a global demographic shift, and family doctors will be responsible for and involved in caring for a growing population of older patients. This book is intended for family medicine trainees and professionals but can also be a useful tool for geriatricians, helping them to better understand some features of primary care and to more fruitfully interact with family doctors.

Long-term Care for the Elderly in Europe Bent Greve, 2016-12-01 Long term care is an increasingly important issue in many contemporary welfare states around the globe given ageing populations This ground breaking book provides detailed case studies of 11 EU member states welfare regimes within Europe to show how welfare states organize structures and deliver long term care and whether there is a social investment perspective in the delivery of long term care This perspective is important because the effect of demographic transitions is often used as an argument for the existence of economic pressure on welfare states and a need for either direct retrenchment or attempts to reduce welfare state spending The book's chapters will look specifically into how different welfare states have focussed on long term care in recent years and what type of changes have taken place with regard to ageing populations and ambitions to curb increases in public sector spending in this area They describe the
