Atlas Gerhard Richter, 2012 Born in Dresden in 1931 Gerhard Richter left the former GDR in 1961 to study in Düsseldorf later living and working in Cologne His practice has redefined the medium of painting combining a rigorous conceptual approach with a sumptuous yet elusive beauty His mastery of genres spans landscapes portraiture still life and abstraction Lying at the heart of his practice is an ongoing project that commenced in 1964 and continues to this day Atlas comprises over five thousand photographs drawings diagrams and proposals that are the foundation of Richter's oeuvre Sometimes used as a source for his painting Richter's album of pictures also demonstrates the complex dialogues he explores between painting and photography history and memory perception and representation This book provides a critical tool for navigating Atlas bringing together Richter's own writings alongside commentaries by an international range of curators critics and art historians

Buchloh, Jean-François Chevrier, Armin Zweite, Rainer Rochlitz, 2000 This publication brings together four texts which analyze Gerhard Richter's monumental project Atlas an assemblage of photographs that he has collected since 1962 Atlas which at present comprises more than 5 000 images ranging from political portraits to landscapes and from found photojournalistic pictures to photographs taken by the artist himself constitutes an ordered collection of personal visual memories from which Richter draws the themes and motifs for his ongoing exploration of the possibilities of painting Buchloh examines Atlas as a mnemonic device comparing Richter's assemblage to Aby Warburg's 1927 monumental project on collective memory Chevrier distinguishes European and American uses of photography and art and positions Richter's work in contrast to that of the Photorealists and American Pop artists Zweite discusses Atlas as a response to the tension between semantics and semiotics in Modernism and Rochlitz analyses the complex relationship between photography and painting in contemporary art with specific reference to Richter's works Ema and Betty Gerhard Richter Robert Storr, Gerhard Richter, 2002 Tour of the exhibition the Museum of Modern Art New York Feb 14 May 21 2002 and others **Gerhard Richter** Gerhard Richter, Armin Zweite, Anette Kruszynski, 2005 Over the past half century Gerhard Richter born 1932 has built up a stylistically heterogeneous and conceptually complex body of painting photography sculpture and artist's books that firmly establishes his status as the most important living artist of our time today this diverse oeuvre totals in excess of 3 000 individual works In February 2012 Hatje Cantz announced the first volume of their Gerhard Richter catalogue raisonné the first of a projected five volumes to be issued over the next seven years Edited by Dietmar Elger director of the Gerhard Richter Archive at the Staatliche Kunstsammlungen Dresden who has spent years researching and preparing the publication this third volume encompasses the works Richter assigned numbers 389 651 2 which span the years 1976 to 1988 Alongside nearly 700 full color plates many of them full page it includes full technical specifications information about the artist's handwritten notes and the provenance bibliography and exhibition history for each individual work This information is further supplemented by commentary quotations from the artist and comparison images Uncertain Histories Kate Palmer Albers, 2015-07-21 The compulsion to dwell on history on how it is recorded stored saved forgotten narrated lost remembered and made public has been at the heart of artists' engagement with the photographic medium since the late 1960s Uncertain Histories considers some of that work ranging from installations that incorporate vast numbers of personal and vernacular photographs by Christian Boltanski Dinh Q L and Gerhard Richter to confrontations with absence in the work of Joel Sternfeld and Ken Gonzales Day Projects such as these revolve around a photographic paradox that hinges equally on

knowing and not knowing on definitive proof coupled with uncertainty on abundance of imagery being met squarely with its own inadequacy Photography is seen as a fundamentally ambiguous medium that can be evocative of the historical past while at the same time limited in the stories it can convey Rather than proclaiming definitively what photography is the work discussed here posits photographs as objects always held in suspension perpetually oscillating in their ability to tell history Yet this ultimately leads to a new kind of knowledge production uncertainty is not a dead end but a generative space for the viewer's engagement with the construction of history

Gerhard Richter, Individualism, and Belonging in West Germany Luke Smythe, 2022-07-29 This book reevaluates the art of Gerhard Richter b 1932 in relation to his efforts to achieve belonging in the face of West Germany's increasing individualism between the 1960s and the 1990s Richter fled East Germany in 1961 to escape the constraints of socialist collectivism His varied and extensive output in the West attests to his greater freedom under capitalism but also to his struggles with belonging in a highly individualised society a problem he was far from alone in facing The dynamic of increasing individualism has been closely examined by sociologists but has yet to be employed as a framework for understanding broader trends in recent German art history Rather than critique this development from a socialist perspective or experiment with new communal structures like a number of his colleagues Richter sought and found security in traditional modes of bourgeois collectivity like the family religion painting and the democratic capitalist state The book will be of interest to scholars working in art history as well as German history culture and politics

The Recording Machine Joshua Shannon, 2017-07-11 A revealing look at the irrevocable change in art during the 1960s and its relationship to the modern culture of fact This refreshing and erudite book offers a new understanding of the transformation of photography and the visual arts around 1968 Author Joshua Shannon reveals an oddly stringent realism in the period tracing artists' rejection of essential truths in favor of surface appearances Dubbing this tendency factualism Shannon illuminates not only the Cold War's preoccupation with data but also the rise of a pervasive culture of fact Focusing on the United States and West Germany where photodocumentary traditions intersected with 1960s politics Shannon investigates a broad variety of art ranging from conceptual photography and earthworks to photorealist painting and abstraction He looks closely at art by Bernd and Hilla Becher Robert Bechtle Vija Celmins Douglas Huebler Gerhard Richter and others These artists explored fact's role as a modern paradigm for talking thinking and knowing Their art Shannon concludes helps to explain both the ambivalent anti-humanism of today's avant garde art and our own culture of fact

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
