Hemingway at Eighteen Steve Paul,Paul Hendrickson,2017-10-01 George Ehrlich Award Recipient In the summer of 1917 Ernest Hemingway was an eighteen year old high school graduate unsure of his future The American entry into the Great War stirred thoughts of joining the army While many of his friends in Oak Park Illinois were heading to college Hemingway couldn t make up his mind and eventually
