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Coverbs and Complex Predicates in Wagiman Stephen Wilson, 1999-06-28 Wagiman is an Australian Aboriginal language spoken by about ten people in the top end of the Northern Territory. It possesses an unusual open class of words which Wilson calls coverbs. Coverbs are responsible for conveying a wide range of mostly verbal and adjectival meanings. They are most frequently paired with an inflecting verb from a closed class to form a complex predicate; the coverb and inflecting verb jointly determine the verbal semantics and argument structure of the clause. This book provides a descriptive and analytical account of the behaviour of coverbs in Wagiman, especially their role in complex predicate formation. The author seeks to discover what governs which pairings of coverbs and inflecting verbs are possible and how the meaning of the whole can be derived from the meanings of the parts. Wilson pursues a formal account of Wagiman complex predicates within Lexical Functional Grammar, seeing complex predicate formation as the fusion of Lexical Conceptual Structures.

Complex Predicates Mengistu Amberber, Brett Baker, Mark Harvey, 2010-04-22 Complex predicates are multipredicational but monoclausal structures. They have proven problematic for linguistic theory, particularly for proposed distinctions between the lexicon, morphology and syntax. This volume focuses on the mapping from morphosyntactic structures to event structure and, in particular, the constraints on possible mappings. The volume showcases the coverb construction, a complex predicate construction which, though widespread, has received little attention in the literature. The coverb construction contrasts with more familiar serial verb constructions. The coverb construction generally maps only to event structures like those of monomorphemic verbs, whereas serial verb constructions map to a range of event structures differing from those of monomorphemic verbs. The volume coverage is truly cross-linguistic, including languages from Australia, Papua New Guinea, Southeast Asia, the Indian subcontinent, East Africa and North America. The volume establishes a new arena of research in event structure, syntax and cross-linguistic typology.

In so doing a parallel is drawn between linguistic diversity and diachrony on the one hand and biological diversity and evolution on the other. It is then suggested that as in biology synchronic universals of grammar are exercised and instantiated primarily as constraints on development and are thus merely the apparent by products of universal constraints on grammaticalization.

Proto-Australian Mark Harvey, Robert Mailhammer, 2024-08-19 This book is the first full evaluation of the Proto Australian hypothesis which proposes that most Australian languages have a common ancestor Proto Australian PA. Using the standard methodologies of historical linguistics the authors show that nearly all Australian languages descend from PA. Given that PA was a single language it was spoken only in a small area of Australia. Its descendants have spread across the continent. Current theories of language spread do not offer clear motivations for large scale spread in hunter gatherer economies. This raises significant questions for analyses of Australian prehistory and archaeology specifically and more widely for general theories of hunter gatherer prehistory and language spread.

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
